

John Fenton is the Deputy Director for Market Surveillance in the Division of Market Oversight of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC). Mr. Fenton, who holds a Masters degree in Economics, has spent most of his career doing market surveillance work at the CFTC. Prior to joining the CFTC he served as an economist at the Bureau of Economic Analysis in the Department of Commerce. Upon joining the CFTC in 1979, he served as a surveillance economist in the New York office, working on, among other things, the cotton, metals, and orange juice markets. In 1988 he transferred to the CFTC's headquarters in Washington to assist the director of market surveillance, with a specialty in financial futures markets. He assumed his current position in 2003. During his career at the CFTC, he has worked on some of the most important cases investigated by the CFTC, including the Hunt silver manipulation case of the early 1980s and the Sumitomo copper manipulation case of the mid 1990s.
