ORDER OF REVOCATION OF REGISTRATION

By Order of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (Commission) dated August 25, 2015, ICE Futures Canada, Inc. (IFCA or Exchange), a foreign board of trade (FBOT) designated by and subject to regulation in Manitoba, Canada by the Manitoba Securities Commission (MSC), was granted registration pursuant to Section 4(b)(1) of the Commodity Exchange Act (the Act), 7 U.S.C. § 6(b)(1), and Part 48 of the Commission's regulations, 17 C.F.R. Part 48, to permit trading by direct access, as that term is defined in Section 4(b)(1)(A) of the Act (FBOT registration).

As the result of an Exchange decision to cease operations in Manitoba, the MSC issued Order No. 7459 dated August 21, 2018, revoking the designations of IFCA as a self-regulatory organization and as a commodity futures exchange.

Commission regulation 48.8(a)(2)(i) specifies that, as a condition for maintaining FBOT registration, "[t]he foreign board of trade will continue to satisfy the criteria for a regulated market or licensed exchange pursuant to the regulatory regime described in its application and will continue to be subject to oversight by the regulatory authorities described in its application."

Commission regulation 48.9(b)(4) provides that "[t]he Commission may revoke a foreign board of trade's registration in the event the foreign board of trade... is no longer authorized, licensed or registered, as applicable, as a regulated market and/or exchange... or ceases to operate as a foreign board of trade..."

In light of the foregoing, **IT IS ORDERED**, pursuant to 17 C.F.R. § 48.9(b)(4), that the registration of IFCA pursuant to Section 4(b)(1) of the Commodity Exchange Act, 7 U.S.C. § 6(b)(1), is hereby revoked, effective August 21, 2018.
